# **Better Book Sale Slated for September 19**

Saturday, September 19, between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. is a great time for book lovers to find a range of better quality books and media while they enjoy the Gazebo Art Festival and Al Sears Jazz Festival in Chandler Park. Many new good condition donations have come in since the Heritage Days book sale including a large number of children/youth books, cook books, and classic literature along with over 250 CDs. The sale includes other subject areas such as: fiction, science fiction/fantasy/horror, history and biography, religion and philosophy, wellness (psychology, health, humor, etc.), and nonfiction.

The sale is a fair weather sale only, so it will be cancelled if persistent rain, beyond a slight drizzle, occurs.

Saturday, September 19, we need volunteers to help with the Better Book Sale at Chandler Park. We need the most volunteers at the beginning and end. One or two sales people are needed during the regular sales times.

# **Library Director Danowski Shares Highlights of Completed Project**

Have you visited the remodeled and expanded Macomb Public Library?

The Macomb Public Library had a "soft opening" on Sunday June 28 during Heritage Days. Two weeks prior to the opening of the Carnegie Library, the staff moved all the books from the Annex and POD to their new locations in the building. The annex is now closed to the public and is used for storing books for the Friends of the Library book sales. Over 250 people attended the opening in the rain to see the expanded Carnegie rooms, new public restrooms with automatic lights, water that goes on when you place your hands in the sink, and auto flush toilets and well as Dyson hand dryers (no paper towels). The old



reading room is now called the Gathering Area and has a replica of the original metal ceiling. The 100 year old original ceiling could not be saved as removal caused it to crumble and the white paint contained lead.

Also in the Carnegie building is a meeting room that will accommodate 30 chairs for lectures. The meeting room was constructed from the old mystery cave, romance section, and large print rooms. Walls were removed and replaced with 20 foot steel beams to hold the second floor in place. The front doors remain as a reminder of the original Carnegie doors. A new circulation desk is now in place where patrons can ask questions, check out books, pick-up reserves, fax, and make copies.

On the first floor is the new children's library with its own information desk.



Entering the children's area you will see display shelving for young children to browse book covers. Each shelf is color coordinated with either a picture or animal to help children find the books in their age group. There is now a play area and foam core steps to sit on for story time and programs. There is a reading nook with couches for parents to read to their children.

There are two ways to visit the second floor or adult area: by the 1903 staircase or elevator. The Adult area is divided into two great rooms: a reading room and the library materials collection. The suspended ceiling is removed and the domes with their globe lighting supply the lighting for the second floor. The second floor outside windows has a distinct appearance with star shaped windows. This design is carried throughout the second floor and replicated on the furniture, chairs, and shelving units (see photos). The second floor new



addition houses the library collection (books, CD, DVD, audio, and magazines), an information desk, reference materials, public access internet, and a teen corner. There is also a reading nook with natural lighting, large windows, and oversize chairs.

The Macomb Public Library Board of Trustees and staff encourage you to visit the Macomb Public Library and see how we have changed to accommodate for the next 100 years.
