Saturday, September 7, between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. is a great time for book lovers to find a range of better condition books and media while they enjoy the Gazebo Art Festival in Chandler Park. Many new goodcondition donations have come in since the Heritage Days book sale including a large number of children/youth books and an extensive amount of DVDs and CDs. The sale includes subject areas such as: fiction, science fiction/fantasy/horror, history and biography, religion and philosophy, wellness (psychology, health, humor, etc.), children/youth books, cook

books and nonfiction.

The sale is a fair weather sale only, so it will be cancelled if persistent rain, beyond a slight drizzle, occurs.

Bill Burton Memorial Patio Project Completed

There's something new at the Macomb Public Library: the Bill Burton Memorial Patio. Bill Burton was for many years a professor of history at WIU, but he also was a man who deeply felt the community significance of libraries. He played a founding role in the creation of The Friends of the Macomb Public Library and served as an officer on the board. Both he and his wife, Doris, thought it was important for libraries to be beautiful on the outside as well as on the inside. For 17 years Doris and Bill planted and maintained flowerbeds of impatiens on the north side of the library.

Bill passed away in 2016, and the memorial funds contributed in his name to the Friends became the incentive to the board to construct the patio by adding supplementary funds. Located on the north side of the library building, the patio, artfully designed by Elsner's Midwest Ornamental Nursery, is a welcoming spot to relax or read for those passing by. A plaque by the patio reads:

Children's Library Activities: Summer Reading & Coming Up This Fall

Summer 2019 proved to be the best summer yet! All children had the same reading goal of 500 minutes. This achievable goal coupled with excellent prizes from McDonald's, Wendy's, Pizza Hut and Rialto Cinemas led to excellent program sign-up and an impressive completion percentage. 467 children signed up for the reading program and 310 finished their reading goal, for a completion percentage of 66%. This is the highest completion percentage during my time at the library.

The library hosted programs nearly daily, including Move and Groove on Mondays, Celebrity Story Time on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and Messy Makers and Mighty Makers on Wednesdays. We also held two movie days and two large programs, Bubble Stations with Absolute Science and Magician Richard Landry. Our most popular programs were Messy Makers and Mighty Makers, both of which routinely topped 40 people! Celebrity readers were another big part of summer reading and included Mayor Inman, Andrea Thompson of Hy-Vee, and a representative of the Farm Bureau among others.

Now that summer reading is over for 2019, we will clean up supplies, catch-up on other work, and start planning

for summer reading 2020, Dig Deeper: Read, Investigate, Discover.

Save the Date for This Fall

Messy Makers will kick off for the fall on Tuesday, September 10 at 10:00 am. Themes for Messy Makers will include Dinosaurs on September 10, Sunflowers on September 17 and Ocean Animals on September 24. All Messy Maker programs include stories, songs, and a craft for ages 2-5 with a caregiver.

Move and Groove on Mondays at 9:30 will continue through the fall for children ages birth to 3 plus a caregiver. Story Time will continue on Thursdays at 10:00 am for children ages 3-5.

Saturday Specials are back for the fall with Fall Y'all on September 21, Moon Over Macomb on October 19, Thankful for You on November 16 and Dickens on the Square on December 7. All Saturday Specials include stories, songs, crafts, and surprise fun!

Library Offers Plethora of Programs for Adult Readers

It has been an exciting few months, for sure! *It's Showtime @ Your Library* was the iRead theme this year for summer reading. We kept the same theme as the Youth and ran our program the same time to be consistent, which was June 1-July 26, 2019.

We had a total of 63 adults sign up to participate in the Adult Summer Reading Program. 33 adults completed the 3 book reading requirement; 52% completion. All who signed up received a Wendy's Frosty book, which required 3 books to be read prior to receiving the free frozen treat. All finishers received a prize. The grand prize this year was 2 season tickets to the Western Illinois University Theatre Department productions for the 2019-2020 academic year. A huge *Thank You!* goes out to Tammy Killian, who donated the awesome grand prize.

This was my first attempt coordinating a Summer Reading Program and it was fun! We had Flat Authors, (based on the Flat Stanley concept), which were authors of Classic literature dressed as their most popular characters. They were published as paper dolls from the book, <u>Literary Greats Paper Dolls</u> by Tim Foley. ISBN: 9780486481173. We scanned them, printed them off in color, cut them out, carefully laminated them, and then cut around them to create the Flat Authors. These were a tremendous hit!

Explore More Illinois kicked off June 1, 2019, which enables participating Illinois public libraries' valid library card holders to login and make reservations and even receive discounts for events and/or admissions into Illinois
